from the PASTOR

Advent Lutheran Church and Saint Mark Lutheran Church became Lutheran Church of the Good Shepherd. This merging of two congregations into a new one with a new name got me thinking about the different kinds of names churches adopt for themselves.

I grew up at St. Paul Lutheran Church in Lititz. The first congregation I served was also named St. Paul Lutheran Church, in Beachwood, NJ. St. Paul is among the most popular names for Lutheran congregations because St. Paul was so influential on the teachings and writings of Lutheranism's founder Martin Luther.

In the early days of Christianity most churches were known by their location and weren't given specific names. Paul the apostle addresses his letters in this way: "to all God's beloved in Rome," "to the church of God that is in Corinth." Early maps of Lancaster City identify what we now know as Trinity Lutheran Church simply as "the Evangelical Lutheran church." Some Lutheran churches retain their early name depicting a place, even here in Lancaster County; so we have Swamp Lutheran Church, Muddy Creek Lutheran Church, Mt. Eden Lutheran Church.

Starting in the 19th century Lutheran churches started adopting specific names for themselves, most often associated with Biblical names or themes. From "Ascension" to "Zion" and just about every Biblical saint and theme in between you'll find a Lutheran church name.

This month will have "Good Shepherd Sunday" in it. Always falling on the fourth Sunday in the season of Easter it's a good time to reflect on our name and it's meaning for our mission in the world. Jesus is the Good Shepherd and we are the "people of God's pasture, the sheep of God's hand." (Psalm 95:7) "My sheep know my voice," Jesus says, "I know them and they follow me." (John 10:27) What greater gift of love and grace can there be than being known by the Good Shepherd? Abundant life consists in being counted as part of the great flock led by the Good Shepherd.

Fifty years ago two congregations, each with venerable and worthy names themselves, chose a new name. May you continue to live into the promise of abundant life, following the voice of the One for whom you are named, "The Lutheran Church of the Good Shepherd."

Dear friends,

When I first came to Good Shepherd, I immediately knew this was a special place. I felt warmly welcomed, and resonated with the tradition of musical and liturgical excellence. Church work can be demanding and difficult at times, but even the hardest times weren't so bad here. I think this was due to Good Shepherd's spirit of "we're in this together."

That spirit was especially apparent when the pandemic hit. I can't imagine a better team than we had. Not only did we do some really cool stuff, but we did so with a strong sense of togetherness.

As my parting message to you, I'd like to encourage you to grow in that spirit of togetherness. You are in an incredible time of transition. Not just staff transition, but figuring out how to leverage your togetherness in furthering your mission with focus and strength. Without strong "top-down" leadership, it will be up to you, the congregation, to engage and strengthen your "bottom-up" leadership.

I say this for two main reasons. Firstly, it's the congregation that is consistent through transition. You don't hear of churches whose staff remains constant through several congregations. Quite the opposite, right? Because of this, it's essential that the congregation actively maintains its own "glue" of togetherness, rather than relying on staff leadership to do this work. This means maintaining consensus, which means having lot of conversations, building on common ground, and responding to each other with openness and curiosity. Most people just want to feel understood. This takes work.

Secondly, your future called pastor will need this from you. If you can maintain your own "glue" of togetherness, you will save them a lot of work, which will mean they can focus their efforts on other important work without burning out.

Finally, a genuine word of thanks. You have collectively changed my life. In several ways you've been my source of inspiration in starting the Columbia School of Music. You've taught me that my voice is valuable and that music is powerful. More than anything, you've taught me to believe in myself. For that I cannot thank you enough. From the bottom of my heart, thank you for all that you are. — Chris

Politics have always been a source of friction in the United States, but things have never been as polarized and ugly as today. We are in a precarious place, where many political and social experts say we are in danger of unraveling altogether.

Christians can help, we who are commanded to love our neighbor as ourselves (Leviticus 19:8, Matthew 22:39) and commended to work for the common good (Isaiah 58:8-14, 1 Corinthians 12:7). We can recommit to good stewardship of our civic virtues, our political process, and national identity.

Here are some ideas:

Seek and Cling to truth: Endeavor to find out what is true. Don't listen to lies and liars, and always speak truth, especially in the face of lies.

Love and pray for those with whom you disagree: Jesus taught us to pray for our enemies (Matthew 5:44). Those who disagree with our politics aren't our enemies, but the principle remains. Love and pray for them.

Don't insult: Engage on issues and policies, not personalities.

Settle for what's fair: Politics works best when both sides compromise. Everyone loses when it's played "all or nothing."

Finally, be a peacemaker: Jesus taught, "Blessed are the peacemakers, for they will be called children of God."

Our country desperately needs cooler heads to prevail if we are to face the future as a healthy democracy. As Christian stewards, we can lead the way.

CANTOR POSITION UPDATE

The Church Council decided at its February meeting not to fill the Cantor position during the pastoral interim. In the meantime, the council has created the position of Interim Director of Music and hired Valerie Lefever Hughes to fill that role. Ms. Hughes will play for worship services, work with the choir and other musicians, plan worship along with the interim pastor, and manage the copyright requirements for printing and livestreaming music. She will assume these duties May 1, though some "behind the scenes" work will take place in April. Because Ms. Hughes already had prior commitments during the month of April, substitute musicians have been secured for those Sunday worship services.

During this interim time, the Church Council intends to study the current job requirements for Cantor and make any adjustments necessary to the position. The Church Council also wants to wait to hire a new permanent Cantor/Parish Musician until a new pastor is called. In that way, the pastor can be involved in the hiring process.

WITTEL FARM GROWING PROJECT BEGINS 9TH SEASON

From beginning to end, trees are a present symbol of life and renewal in the Bible. This year, we will contemplate the significance of trees at the farm, in our lives, and for the earth. We will be planting some native trees this spring, too! The winter is coming to an end and spring buds and leaves are just around the corner. At the Wittel Farm, that means plans and preparations for another growing season are underway! The season will officially kick off this year with a special **Earth Day Planting Day on April 20**th with a blessing of the seeds, soils, trees, plants, birds, and insects. Join us at 9:00 am for a short service of blessing followed by some planting time. Volunteers can sign up for Saturdays in March, April, and May. The spring season involves a lot of planting, both seeds and plants. Starting the week of June 9th, a regular weekly rhythm of Tuesdays, Thursdays, and Saturdays will begin again for volunteers. Each day, we will have farm chores, education, and fun in community. We begin at 9:00 am and end each day by 3:00 pm. Volunteers may determine their arrival and departure times between 9:00 and 3:00. Please, as always, wear appropriate closed-toe footwear. Gloves, hats, and water bottles are recommended. Annual waivers are available on the website and SignUp Genius.

This year, we are offering three special events on the farm called Summer Eco-Education Days (SEED). On June 8, July 6, and August 10, from 11:00 am to 1:00 pm we will hold **lunch-and-learn events for kids and adults**. We will learn about the various practices of regenerative agriculture and explore the impact they are having on the farm. We will learn about soil health, composting, cover cropping, biodiversity, and the ways we are implementing a model of ecological farming to protect the earth and grow healthy food to share. We may even learn how to process our elderberries into jam and wine! Lunch will be provided and the cost is \$10.00. We continue to expand both crop diversity and distribution partners. We hope to grow more volunteers this season, too!






