What are "Rogation Days?"

Stewardship of creation is an ongoing ministry in the church. The creation, which God declared good, is entrusted to the care of humankind. Exercising that care is one dimension of daily Christian discipleship.

Rogation Days are a way for the church to honor God for the gift of creation and to pray for the land, the gift of labor, and the needs of all people. Rogation Days were traditionally celebrated during the fifty days of Easter on the Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday before Ascension Day. The word, Rogation, has its roots in the Latin word "rogare" which means to ask or petition and it comes from the ancient introit for the Sunday preceding the Ascension. In some places, the celebrations of Rogation Days were quite elaborate and included processions from the church to and around fields while asking for God's blessing.

Churches that have maintained the practice of celebrating Rogation Days in our time now no longer mark these days specifically before Ascension. Instead, Rogation Days are celebrated at times and places that meet local needs. With an increased awareness of the need for the stewardship of creation both within the church and within contemporary culture, the themes of thanksgiving for the land and petitions for a fruitful earth may be adapted around broader cultural celebrations of Earth Day or at other times.

Although Rogation Days are agricultural celebrations, they are not solely for rural congregations. These days underscore the dependence of all people, urban and rural, on the fruitfulness of the earth and human labor. The themes of Rogation Days may be highlighted in a special worship service or in prayers of intercession in the Sunday assembly during the spring.

The "Merry Month of May" presents us with several opportunities for celebration and remembrance, both in our general community life and our faith-community life as well.

May Day, May 1, is half-remembered by older folks as the first spring flower festival. May poles, dancing, a "spring is in the air" frivolity ushers in the first really pleasant month of the summer season. May Day continues to be an important celebration in parts of Europe but is largely forgotten here.

When I think of the more "secular" May holidays I think of Mother's Day and Memorial Day. While neither one finds an official place in the church's liturgical calendar, both are opportunities to give thanks to God for very specific and important people. Our mother's, both those who are living and those who now live with God, helped shape us into who we are. Without their love and support our lives would be entirely different. Jesus brings to mind a mother hen as a powerful image for the protective love of God; "How often would I have gathered your children together, like the hen gathers her nest under her wings!" *Luke 13:14*. On Memorial Day we remember those who died in service to their country. (Unlike Veteran's Day, which remembers all who served). We express our profound thanks to God for their sacrifice and the sacrifice made by their families even as we pledge to always remember their lives.

There are really three important church festivals that fall this year during May: Ascension, Pentecost, and Trinity Sunday. Ascension is always on the sixth Thursday after Easter because scripture tells us Jesus ascended into heaven 40 days after he rose from the dead. Not many churches hold Ascension worship on Thursdays, which I think is a bit of a shame. Pentecost occurs on the eighth Sunday after Easter because that's 50 days after Jesus rose from the dead and the day the Holy Spirit descended upon the disciples creating the Church. Pentecost begins the great missionary journey of the Church taking the Good News of Jesus into all the world. Finally, Holy Trinity Sunday always falls on the Sunday after Pentecost. It's the only church festival that doesn't celebrate an event in the life of Jesus. Rather it celebrates the great article of Christian faith, that the One God is known to us in Three Persons: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.

I like the connection between the words "holidays" and "holy days." As you might guess, they come from the same source. While we are accustomed to dividing the world up into the sacred and secular, I don't always find those distinctions helpful. If all of life is permeated and filled with the love of God then those lines of separation are often blurred. Celebrations of spring, and thankfulness for mothers (and all who exercise a mothering love) and thankfulness for those who sacrificed their lives, whether in the military or in some other type of service, are intertwined with the Lord who rules from his heavenly throne and whose Holy Spirit gives life, not only to the Church, but to the whole world.

May is a wonderful month to remind us that God presence fills all of life: in creation, in our families, in our nation, in the Church. Thanks be to God!

THE NEGLECTED FESTIVAL

Let's prepare for Pentecost.

We all know the major festivals of our church, right? Christmas and Easter. They are the two major festivals of the ELCA. But not so fast. What about the neglected major festival? What about Pentecost?

Christmas and Easter are huge celebrations for at least two reasons:

- The biblical stories that are the foundations of these festivals (i.e., the birth of baby Jesus, the Savior of the world, and the resurrection from the dead of that same Jesus) are momentous.
- These religious festivals have been "picked up" or commercialized, if you will, by the secular world.

But not "poor, old" Pentecost.

No Pentecost carols exist. No Pentecost shopping. No Pentecost candies. No trees, lights, gifts, baskets, eggs or bunnies. We don't have Pentecost sunrise services. Pentecost suffers from an inferiority complex. It's most often neglected.

We prepare for Christmas, the birth of the Christ child, by having four Sundays in Advent. We prepare for the celebration of Jesus' resurrection with special Ash Wednesday services and then 40 days of Lent followed by Holy Week. What preparation do we have for Pentecost? How do we make our parishioners ready for the coming of the Spirit? In most cases the answers to those questions are: "We have no specific preparations" and "We don't make them ready for the coming of the Spirit."

Why not? Why can't we? Why don't we? Back in 2001 I started something new before Pentecost. The congregation I served gave Pentecost a "warm-up week" similar to Advent and Lent. We designated the Sunday before Pentecost as "PrePent" Sunday. Red is the color for that season—much like having poinsettias at Christmas and lilies at Easter—so we had red geraniums at Pentecost. We made every effort to make this pre-Pentecost season very special. We didn't (and still don't) want Pentecost to continue to get short shrift on our festival calendar.

I wrote the above words for an article that appeared in *The Lutheran* in June 2001. It seems that Pentecost is still not celebrated like Christmas and Easter, so maybe my words are still relevant.

Therefore, I again raise my call to make our church one that can say, "We have three major festivals, and we celebrate all three!" Amen.

FINANCE COMMITTEE Q1 FINANCIAL SUMMARY

- a. January-March income versus expenses is positive, but we shouldn't have a false sense of security at this moment. The congregation responded to the need with some one-time gifts that helped give us a strong start to 2024. We'll need to watch upcoming months/weeks closely and continue to communicate our financial condition.
- b. Balance sheet through Q1 2024 shows a deficit of -\$70,745. This is similar to the congregation's position in Nov. 2023 finances are stable now, but we've not made significant headway on negative General Operation Fund Balance.

EXPENSE REDUCTION ACTIONS:

- 1. **Mortgage Modification:** Our current outstanding mortgage balance is \$302,467.66 and monthly payment is \$6,348.00. Our lender, Mission Investment Fund, has agreed to reduced payments for a six-month period detailed below:
 - I. April 1 -- June 1 our payment is \$3,500
 - II. July 1 Sept 1 our payment is \$5,000
 - III. Return to norma payment of \$6,348 on Oct 1
 - IV. Total savings from modified payment is \$12,588
- 2. **Pledge Adjustment:** The annual pledges to the following organizations were adjusted down 25% Synod, Luthercare, World Hunger Appeal, Contact, Samaritan Center, Lafayette Fire Co., Camping Corporation, United Seminary. Additionally, the congregation will only send what is collected for the World Hunger Appeal and Lancaster Co. Food Hub moving forward. These actions represent a \$23,950 reduction v. 2024 spending plan.

WHAT'S NEEDED FROM THE CONGREGATION:

While the Finance Committee will continue to analyze expenses and suggest actions for the Congregation's Council Members, we still need increased individual giving to shore up finances. The summer months will be a particular concern as we typically experience a decrease in giving.

Focus on this matter is important to the future. As the Call Committee is building our congregation's profile to attract candidates, the financial condition of Good Shepherd will be an important topic. We need everyone's help and focus to solve this situation and build a strong financial foundation with a new pastor in mind.


ADULT ED: POWER INTERFAITH LANCASTER EDUCATION FUNDING—A MATTER OF STEWARDSHIP

The Towards Racial Justice Small Group will welcome Beth Reeves, chair of the Education Committee of POWER Interfaith Lancaster as our presenter for Adult Education on May 12, at 11:15 am in the Good Shepherd Room.

We are entering the season for action in a long-standing effort to change the way that Pennsylvania funds schools for poor and Black and Brown children. There's lots of work to do, and this year, it actually seems that what we do will make a difference!

Here's why this work is important: Pennsylvania Commonwealth Court recognized the educational benefit of increased resources when they ruled that Pennsylvania schools were unconstitutionally underfunding poor school districts. In response, Pennsylvania's Basic Education Funding Commission has just released a report recommending how to close the gap between rich and poor school districts. For the first time, school funding would be based on what students need, rather than local wealth.

THE PROBLEM (AND POWER) OF MONEY

[Jesus told the rich man] "You lack one thing; go, sell what you own, and give the money to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven; then come, follow me." When he heard this, he was shocked and went away grieving, for he had many possessions. [Jesus taught the disciples,] "It is easier for a camel to go through the eye of a needle than for someone who is rich to enter the kingdom of God." – Mark 10:21b-22, 25

Wealth poses spiritual risks. Jesus teaches that money has the power to turn us inward – away from loving God with all our heart and loving our neighbor as ourselves. It confuses our values and direction. That was the issue with the rich man in Mark 10:17-27. Deeply religious, he nonetheless worries about eternal life. The "one thing" he lacks, Jesus tells him, can be satisfied by selling what he has and giving to the poor. Generous giving would break the bond that money has over him and help re-center him on loving God and loving neighbor.

Generosity is the spiritual prescription Jesus gives the rich man, and it's the one for us, too.
